In September 2019, a representative from the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) attended the Los Angeles County Ambulance Association meeting requesting interested parties to contract for screening services at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). Subsequently, McCormick Ambulance, which is the largest ambulance company in the area with the closest accessibility to LAX was directly contacted by DHS Agent Dev D. Jani to assist US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) in this effort. EMTs would assist CBP officers with passenger screening of all arriving flights at LAX originating from mainland China. Details of the request were not immediately clear, but McCormick agreed to participate while we learned more about the operation. Initially, the request was for only nine (9) EMTs to assist on a part-time basis. At that time, Operations Manager David Konieczy was asked to work with DHS and CBP to lead the coordination of what was expected to be a short-term but highly visible project. David agreed and soon implemented a training program, scheduling process, and security clearances for the participating crews. Within a very short period of time, the project escalated, and the scope of screening expanded to more and more incoming flights. Requests for more and more personnel began to overwhelm the resources of McCormick Ambulance. David immediately contacted American Medical Response (AMR) Regional Director Ken Liebman for back-up. Within weeks, AMR's national disaster response team was deployed, still under the direction of Manager Konieczy. By early January 2020, he was managing a small army of EMTs and paramedics at multiple terminals throughout LAX for what we now know would become a worldwide pandemic. As of today, Manager Konieczy is still managing crews from McCormick and AMR at LAX (COVID as well as Ebola) in addition to his exceptionally busy duties as Operations Manager for McCormick Ambulance. Throughout this entire deployment, David has shown extraordinary leadership and dedication to his EMS co-workers and has represented McCormick/AMR (and our entire ambulance industry) to the United States government with impeccable class and professionalism. This is not only service affecting statewide EMS but has national and worldwide impact due to the prominence of LAX as one of the largest international airports in one of the highest COVID-impacted cities. For this we are honored to recommend David Konieczy for the Star of Life award. **

Michael Tyson Firefighter/ **Engineer/EMT Humbolt Bay Fire Joint Powers** Authority

At 7:42 pm on August 3, 2021 Humboldt Bay Fire was dispatched to a report of a male floating in the water of the Elk River Slough near Pound Road. Engine 8112 responded with one Rescue Swimmer trailed by Truck 8181 with three Rescue Swimmers and proceeded to the foot of Pound Road at the Hikshari Trail to make access to the patient. Meanwhile, Battalion 8102 and Engine 8114 with one Rescue Swimmer deployed from the Southbound 101 bridge access point to the slough. Engine 8112 was the first to arrive on scene and Rescue Swimmer **Michael Tyson** located a passerby who was able to dictate the rough location of the patient. Scanning the waterway, Tyson spotted what looked to be a face floating about 200 yards away between the train trestle bridge and Southbound 101 bridge, although it was unclear if the patient was face up or face down in the water. Tyson ran along the shoreline until parallel with the patient. At this time, it became clear that the patient was face up in the water, but remained unresponsive to calls from Tyson. Tyson deployed from the shoreline into the water while another Rescue Swimmer from Engine 8114 deployed from the Highway 101 access point, both Swimmers approaching the patient from either end of the slough. Tyson quickly reached the patient, grabbing him by the shoulder. The patient was alive, but hypothermic and unresponsive. The Swimmers quickly swam the patient back to shore, where three awaiting Rescue Swimmers helped get the patient out of the water and his wet clothing. Once out of the water, the patient's condition improved and he was able to be walked, with assistance, to Engine 8114 staged on Southbound Highway 101 where he was wrapped in heated blankets and given a medical assessment by an HBF paramedic. From there, the patient was transported to St. Joseph Hospital by City Ambulance. The Humboldt Bay Fire Water Rescue Team Coordinator commented after the incident, calling it a "legitimate save." "We are extremely proud of the members of our Water Rescue Team, especially Rescue Swimmer Michael Tyson. Had he not taken the actions he did, the patient would not have made it given the water temperature, the length of time he had been out there, and his previous medical conditions."
